## Fightin' Christians nickname ousted at EC

(TMS) - The Elon College Fightin' Christians have headed into the fire, and will resurrect next season as the Phoenix.

This follows the final baseball game of the season on May 18, where the school's ecclesiastical nickname, as well as its mascot, Mr. E, appeared for the last time.

The time for a new sports nickname came when school officials of the school, which is affiliated with the United Church of Christ, decided that they needed a trendier name and flashier, more marketable logo.

## Indiana student believed to have been abducted

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. - After finding few, if any, clues after nearly five days of investigating, police say they have reason to believe missing University of Indiana student Jill Behrman may have been abducted.

The 19-year-old was last seen around 9:30 a.m. Wednesday, as she took a bike ride in the Bloomington area.

Bloomington Police Sgt. Rick
Helms said that the student's
abandoned bicycle was noticed
about 90 minutes after she began her
ride. The bike was found on
Bloomington's northwest side in an
area more than 10 miles from her
home, a distance an experienced
cyclist could cover easily in that
span of time. A water bottle similar
to the one she carried also was
found, but other clues were scarce.

The Bloomington Police
Department's press release describes
Behrman's attire as black bike pants
and a red-and-white sleeveless shirt.
For now, since there are so little
leads, no mass searches are being
conducted but the police are
exploring "other avenues of
investigation."

## Police say jealousy may have been the cause of Illinois killing

CARBONDALE - Last Friday, Chicago native Renee DiCicco introduced a new friend in her life to co-workers at Southern Illinois University's Touch of Nature outdoors center.

DiCicco, a 1999 SIU graduate, had invited Brett Janecke down from Chicago, where he lived with his brother. The two 22-year-olds were to spend the weekend camping and swimming in the woods that were DiCicco's frequent playground.

But by daybreak Saturday, after what investigators described as a savage attack that they believe was borne of jealousy, DiCicco was dead and Janecke lay in the intensive-care unit of a St. Louis Hospital.

Authorities allege DiCicco's former boyfriend, Donald Forcum, 28, broke into the one-story home they once shared about two miles from the SIU campus and brutally attacked the two victims just before 2 a.m.
